

How Does Fiber-Optic Cable Work?

Over the last 20 years or so, fiber-optic lines have taken over the telecommunications industry, primarily to increase the speed of digital information transmission. When fiber-optic cable replaces copper wiring, it also lowers maintenance costs, increases the data-carrying capacity of internet connections and improves phone clarity and TV reception.

To help you understand the basics of how a fiber-optic cable works, we'll start with this example: Imagine a flexible plastic pipe that's several miles long with its insides coated with a perfect mirror. Now imagine you are looking into one end of the pipe and several miles away at the other end, a friend turns on a flashlight and shines it into the pipe. Because the interior of the pipe is a perfect mirror, the flashlight's light will reflect off the sides of the pipe and you will see it at the other end. If your friend were to turn the flashlight on and off in a Morse code fashion, your friend could communicate with you through the pipe. That is the essence of how a fiber-optic cable works.

However, making a cable out of a mirrored tube would be bulky and difficult. That's why fiber-optic cable is actually composed of incredibly pure glass, so pure so that even though it is several miles long, light can still make it through. This glass is drawn into a very thin strand with a thickness comparable to that of a human hair, and then coated in two layers of reflective plastic. A light source—typically a laser —switches on and off rapidly at one end of the cable to transmit digital data. The light travels through the glass strands and continuously reflects off of the inside of the mirrored plastic coatings in a process known as total internal reflection. Systems based on fiber optics can transmit billions of bits of data per second, and they can even carry multiple signals along the same fiber by using lasers of different colors.

Fiber Grants for Avery and Caldwell Counties

More North Carolinians in rural and remote areas will have access to high-speed internet thanks to grants received by entities including SkyLine for fiber construction in Avery and Caldwell counties.


SkyLine was awarded a \$97,000 partner grant through the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) and the Avery Chamber of Commerce to extend broadband connectivity to identified unserved and underserved parts of Avery County. SkyLine will bring fiberto-the-premise (FTTP) connectivity to the Riverside area, with services provided by SkyBest.

SkyLine also will benefit from a GREAT (Growing Rural Economies with Access to Technology) grant from the North Carolina Department of Information Technology. Blue Ridge Energy is leading the engineering and construction of fiber-optic infrastructure in parts of northern Caldwell County. As construction is completed, SkyBest Communications will provide highspeed internet service to customers.

The grant-funded area in Caldwell County includes more than 400 homes and businesses located off Highway 268 from Indian Grave Road to the Wilkes County line where no internet service other than satellite or cellular is currently available. The project will be implemented in phases with these proiected timelines for completion: Phase 1 by spring 2022, Phase 2 by fall 2022 and Phase 3 by early 2023.

Museums are Back Open!

Blowing Rock Art & History Museum, Caldwell Heritage Museum and the Museum of Ashe County History

The historic COVID-19 pandemic temporarily closed these three history museums, preventing them from having visitors inside to tour their amazing exhibits. But through resourcefulness and determination, they maintained ties to their communities despite the challenges, and they're now open again. SkyLine/SkyBest encourages you to check out their websites and make plans to visit soon with family and friends.

Blowing Rock Art & History Museum (BRAHM) blowingrockmuseum.org

BRAHM invites visitors to experience art and discover history. In addition to being a museum that connects people to the rich heritage of the Southern Appalachian region, BRAHM also serves as a community cultural center with a focus on engagement, enrichment and education.

Even during the period when BRAHM was closed to visitors due to the pandemic, it still found ways to connect with its members and supporters. "We offered online programs about our exhibits, BRAHM at Home online outreach and art lessons for children," noted Office Manager Sharon Caldwell. In conjunction with the Kennedy Herterich Foundation and other donors, BRAHM also

gave free art supply kits to all Watauga County K-3 students in 2020 and K-4 students in 2021 to use at home.

Now fully open, BRAHM is preparing for events including the Summer Exhibition Celebration on July 16 and the Plein Air Festival from August 18 through 21. October 2021 will mark the 10th anniversary of BRAHM, and additional events will take place then to celebrate.

Caldwell appreciates that with the increased level of activity at BRAHM, one thing she doesn't have to think about is the performance of BRAHM's communications services. SkyLine/SkyBest provides phone lines, a phone system and broadband.

Caldwell Heritage Museum

All kinds of people visit Caldwell Heritage Museum for all kinds of reasons. Executive Director Cindy Hedrick Day remarked, "The museum is a great place to learn about Caldwell County, its communities and its people. People ask us where they should visit in the area, and about restaurants and places to stay. We love our summer visitors, many of whom are from far away. Recently we had a Texas family stop by. The dad knew about Caldwell Heritage Museum and brought his parents, who live here but weren't familiar with us. It was a win-win for all! We even had a man from Sweden come to do research for a book of fiction he was writing."

Caldwell Heritage Museum is located in the last remaining building of the former Davenport College in Lenoir. Its exhibits, artifacts and photographs teach visitors about the early years and formation of Caldwell County and feature topics including Native American artifacts, Fort Defiance, the Keyhole House, railroad history and furniture.

While Caldwell Heritage Museum's focus is on the past, its board keeps its eyes on the future. This includes looking for the best values in phone and internet services moving forward. After considering various options, it determined that SkyLine/ SkyBest best met the museum's needs.

Museum of Ashe County History

The Museum of Ashe County History is dedicated to the preservation of the historic Ashe County Courthouse building as a county heritage museum. Built in 1904 by local craftsmen using materials

including handmade bricks, local timber and local soapstone, it functioned as the Ashe County Courthouse until being turned over to the Museum of Ashe County History in 2000.

Executive Director Ramona Renfroe said, "We're a go-to spot for locals to bring out-of-town family and friends. Visitors are often surprised that a small community has such a detailed and professional museum."

Renfroe saw a silver lining in the seven months the Museum of Ashe County History had to be closed due to the pandemic. She explained, "Our staff continued to work behind the scenes during this period on collections including our exquisite new Native American exhibit. It focuses on the Native people in Ashe County—mostly Cherokee and Shawnee—and features interesting artifacts such as an effigy mask made of stone. This exhibit benefited from the extra time we had to prepare it."

It's vital to the functioning of the Museum of Ashe County History to have reliable communications services. SkyLine/SkyBest provides broadband, phone lines and an security system.


